Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is Breast Cancer Awareness month - a period to learn more about breast cancer, a period to support everyone affected by breast cancer, and an opportunity to support breast cancer charities.

According to CRUK, about 150 people are diagnosed with breast cancer in the UK, everyday. This means that someone is told she has breast cancer every 10 minutes. Despite this, many still ignore breast cancer screening invitations with the assumption that breast cancer is of no relevance to them. This needs to change.

In support of Breast Cancer Awareness Month 2020, Answer Cancer will be hosting a series of virtual engagement sessions to highlight the importance of talking about breast cancer in homes, workplaces and community groups. The sessions will provide you with an opportunity to hear from survivors, Answer Cancer Champions, and people who work to improve breast cancer services within Manchester. There will be live interviews on several community radio stations and Answer Cancer social media channels in English as well as other languages. Stakeholder collaborative:

Activities for the month kicked off with the Answer Cancer stakeholder collaborative event. Due to Covid-19, the event was held on zoom on the 8th September 2020. It was a moment of reflection for the Answer Cancer team and a time to celebrate the achievements of our community champions. Online Training:

Answer cancer also rolled out a brand-new training module during September 'Train the Facilitator – Training for Answer Cancer Champions'. The course aims to equip Answer Cancer Champions with the skills, knowledge and the confidence to be able to run a short cancer awareness session. Radio Skills training:

A number of Answer Cancer Champions enrolled on ALL FM's free Covid Blues radio training during the month of September. This will prepare them for October when Answer Cancer will be making a number of broadcasts on community radio stations to mark Breast Cancer Awareness month. This is what one attendee had to say:

Engagement sessions:

As Answer Cancer widens its outreach work, the engagement team joined groups outside Manchester virtually, this September. These included Diversity Matters NW (Tameside), Fatima Women's Association, (Oldham) and the Disability Panel (Oldham).

Banner Making Competition

Your questions Answered >>>

Q: I have a breast discharge. Do I need to worry?

A: Nipple discharge isn't usually a sign of anything serious, but there is a small chance it could be cancer so it's a good idea to get it checked just in case. Some women have nipple discharge from time to time so it's about knowing what is normal for you and keeping an eye out for any changes.

If you have any concerns or the discharge is bloodstained, smelly or accompanied by other symptoms such as a lump or pain, please speak to your doctor.
